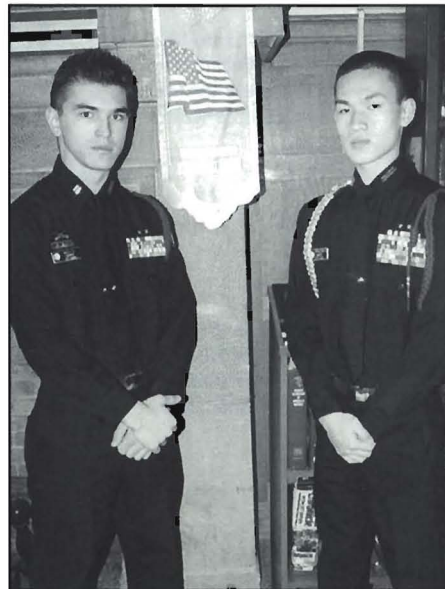


What does it mean to be a junior?

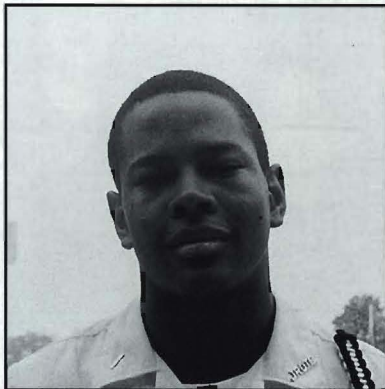


Where do you expect to be in 2 years?

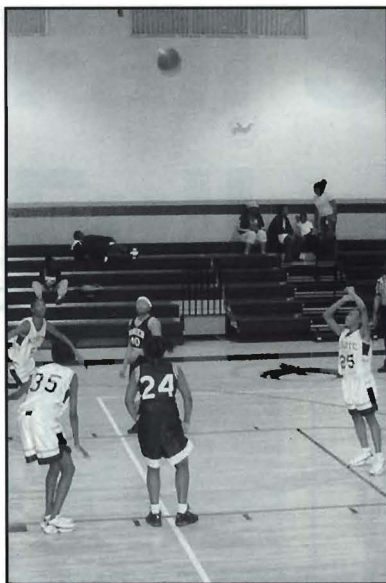

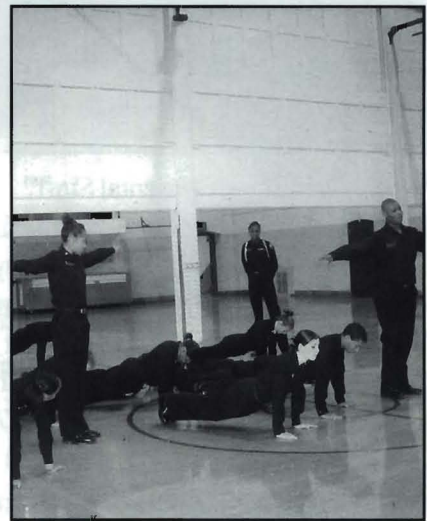

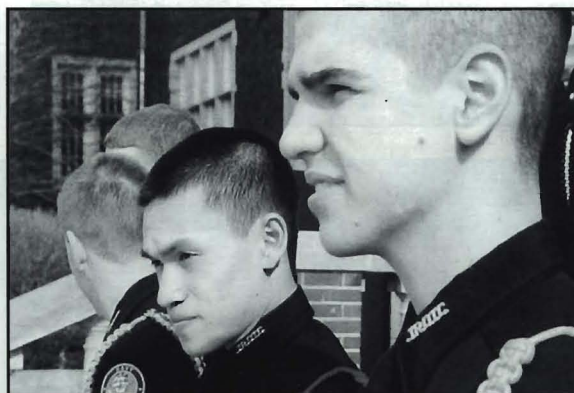

During Homecoming week, everyone gets caught up in the spirit. We are busy buying tickets, new outfits to sport, and looking for ways to show our support for the football team.

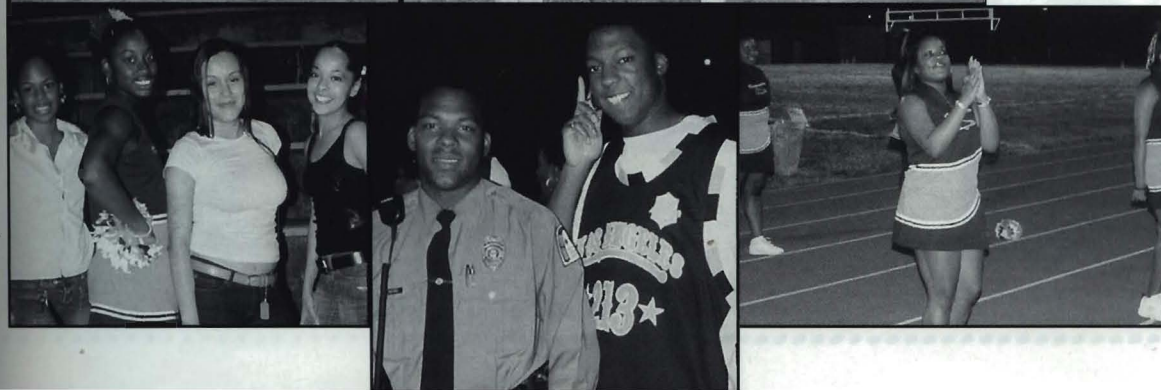

Together we can make it."

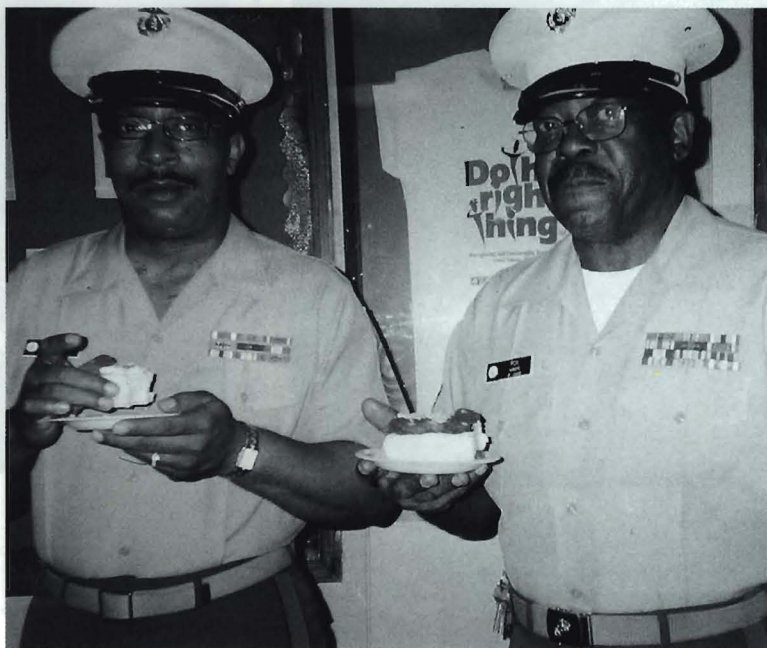

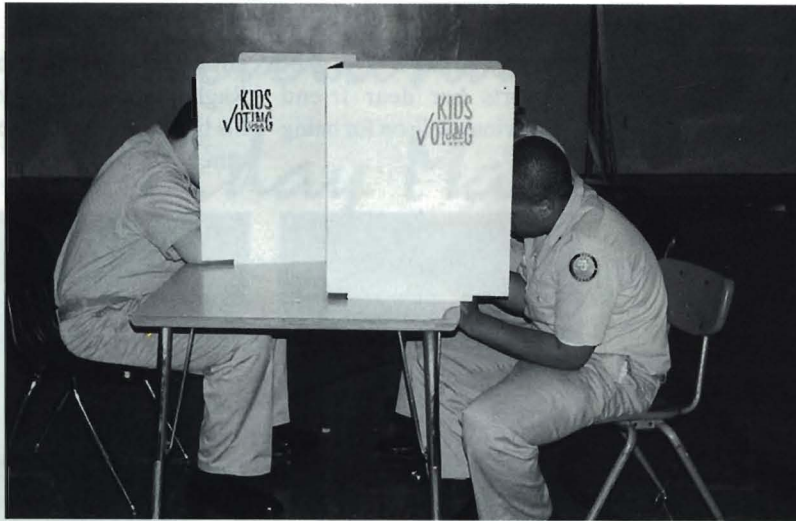

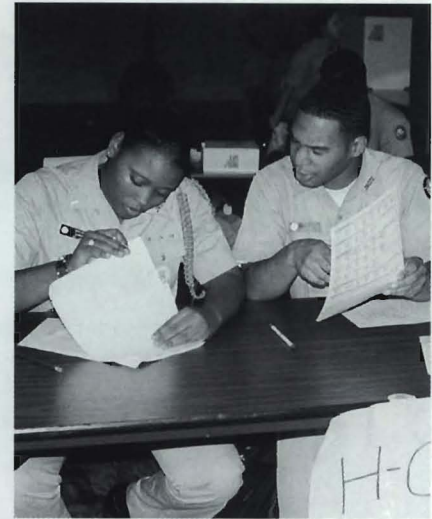

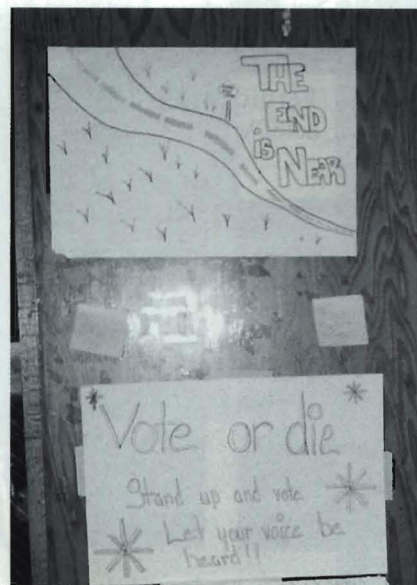
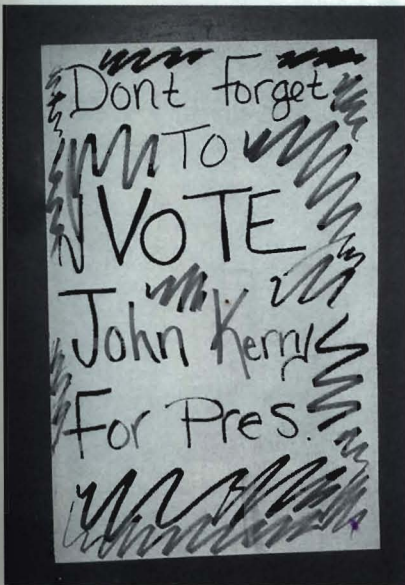

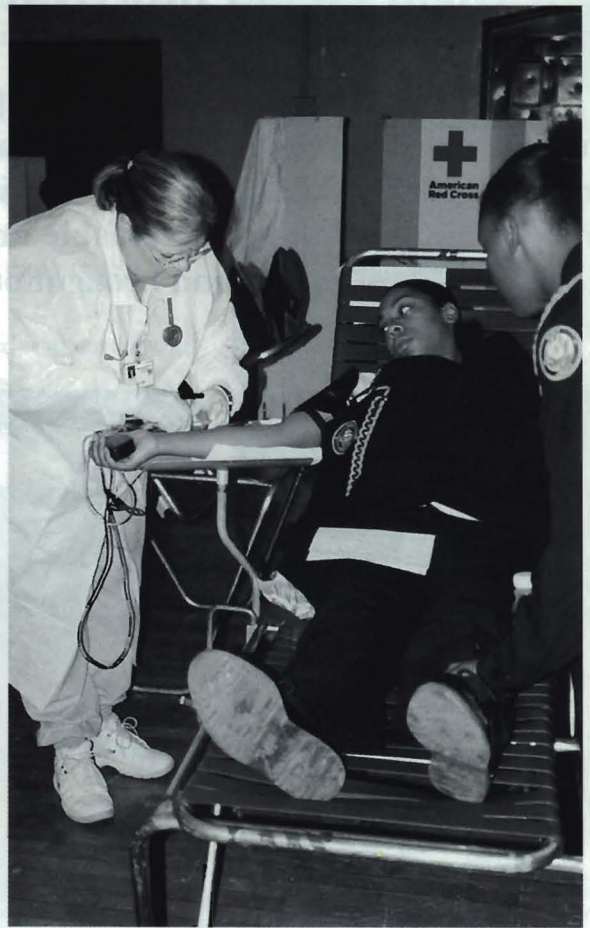

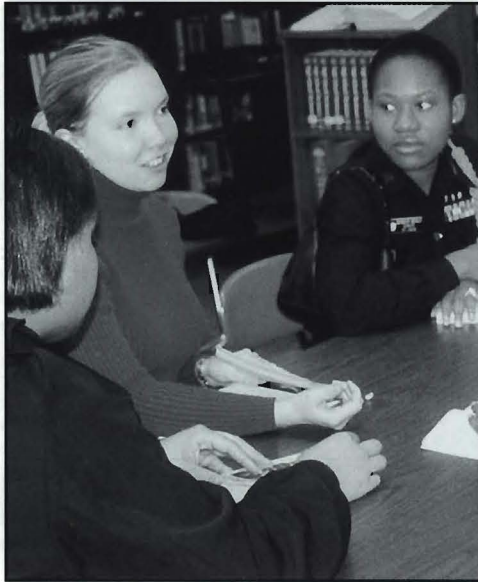

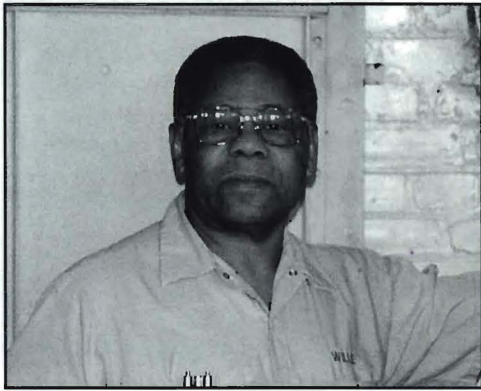
Cleveland's Cleaning Crew

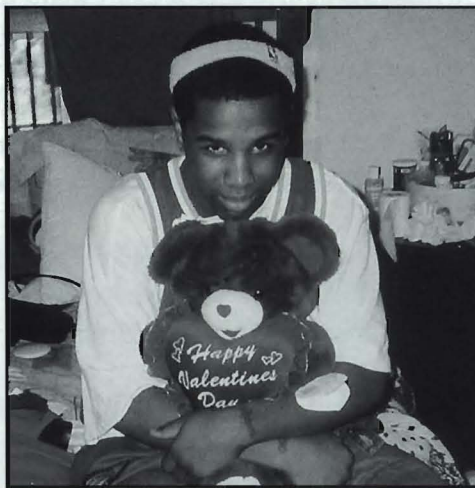
