What is Title I.

Title I (pronounced "Title One") is the largest federal aid program for elementary, middle and high schools. The purpose of this title is to insure that all children have a fair, equal and significate opportunity to obtain a high quality education and reach, at a minimum, proficiency on state academic achievement standards and state academic assessments.

Parents Right to Know

Under Title I parents have the right to know:

- Qualifications for teachers and paraprofessionals who instruct the child
- Level of achievement of their child on each of the state's academic assessments.
- Child's assignments for four or more weeks consecutive weeks to a teacher who is not highly qualified as defined by the law.

SLPS Parental Involvement

The St. Louis Public Schools has a written parent involvement policy stating how the district and schools will support the important roles of parents in education. St. Louis Public Title I schools have a written parent involvement plan addressing the following parent requirements: Communication, Shared responsibilities for high student academic achievements, building captivity for involvement and accessibility. Plans also include a school compact which is a written statement of what schools and parents are supposed to do to help student achievement.
