<p>Many nonfiction texts include both facts and opinions. As you read, it's important to distinguish between the two so you can make your own decisions about the topic. Identify <i>facts</i> by looking for statements that can be proven. <i>Opinions</i> express feelings or belief. Readers may agree with an opinion, but it cannot be proven.</p> <p>Can you identify which of these statements are fact, and which are opinion?</p> <p>Statement 1: "I've heard they're going to build a new theme park somewhere around here. Apparently, my brother read it on someone's Facebook page and it had 172 'likes'."</p> <p>Statement 2: Nav suspects that a new theme park is likely to be built near his school. No officials have said this yet, but the leader of the city council has said she was "very positive" about it. Nav reckons that there will be an official announcement soon.</p> <p>Statement 3: A new theme park is to be built just outside the town. An official representative of Theme Parks R Us Inc. has confirmed in a statement today that building work will start in September.</p> <p>Statement 4: I can't believe they are building a new theme park right around the corner from me!
