Certain genres of text, such as news reports and other information sources, traditionally are supposed to state facts. They do not include the <i>opinion</i> of the author, or <i>rumor</i> (click here for definition). Particular signal words and phrases can often clue you in to whether you are hearing fact, opinion, or rumor. Signal Words: Facts <u>Facts/Evidence</u> •On June 2 (specific date), •In the year... •According to... •In the article, •The author states, •In the text, Signal Words: Opinion <u>Opinions/Claims</u> •I think... •I believe... •I feel... •In my opinion... •In my point of view... •People should...	After World War II, Germany was carved into 4 zones, each governed by the victorious allies (USA, France, Britain, and USSR). Later on, the American, French, and British zones consolidated to become West Germany. The USSR zone became East Germany. Although Berlin was situated in East Germany, it was divided, too, between the allies and the USSR. Eventually, the USSR government installed a hard border between their part of Berlin and the part controlled by the allies. This “Berlin wall” would stand for the next 20+ years and become a symbol of the Cold War. Click here to view a photo essay depicting the Berlin Wall over time. (Content warning: violence and death) 	A suffix is added to a word to change its meaning and part of speech. Sometimes you have to double the final consonant, drop the final <i>e</i>, or change a final <i>y</i> to an <i>i</i> in a root word before adding a suffix. The song became associated with several different revolutions in the USSR, becoming a freedom anthem for some young people at the time. In 2020, the podcast “Wind of Change” explored a rumor that the song was written by the American Central Intelligence Agency and given to <i>Scorpions</i> to produce and release. This means the creators of the podcast do not know for sure if the story they are telling is really true, so we should not take it as fact.
