

The Missouri Civics Education Initiative

- The Missouri Civics Education Initiative requires high school students to pass an examination on the provisions and principles of American civics.
- The law states that the examination shall consist of 100 questions similar to the one hundred questions used by the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) on the naturalization exam. - We comply with this state law through a series of five tests. This study guide includes 21 questions regarding Rights and Responsibilities, Recent American History and Other Important Historical Information.

- 15th Amendment All male citizens can vote
- 19th Amendment Women can vote
- 24th Amendment You don't have to pay to vote (No Poll Tax)
- 26th Amendment Voting Age is 18

- April 15
- The deadline for filing federal tax forms is April15.

#10 When must all men register for the Selective Service?

- At age eighteen (18)
- Between eighteen (18) and twenty-six (26)
- All men aged 18 to 26 living in the U.S. are required to register with Selective Service.

Note: The Selective Service system is the government agency responsible for registering men for a military draft should one be needed. Almost all men age 18-25 who are citizens or immigrants living in the US. are required to be registered with Selective Service.
