Missouri Civics Education Initiative -- Study Guide #4

The Missouri Civics Education Initiative requires any student entering 9th grade to pass an examination on the provisions and principles of American civics. The law states that the examination shall consist of 100 questions similar to the one hundred questions used by the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) on the naturalization exam.
