

# emphasis

### **DEFINITION:**

special attention or importance; special importance given to a word or phrase by saying it louder or higher, or by printing it in a special way

### **SENTENCES**

 Police officers place emphasis on wearing seatbelts for safety.

 Publishers often use large bold print to show emphasis in text.

# emphasis

Publishers often use large bold print to show emphasis in text.

Within a larger body of text, a piece in *italics* does not stand out much; instead, it signifies a context difference only while the text is being read. By contrast, a single word in **boldface** attracts the human cyclair and is therefore recommended for keywords the reader might be looking for.


