


Words of the Week #32 Academic Vocabulary





- scrutiny = a close or careful examination or investigation; If something is under scrutiny, it is being studied or observed very carefully.
- beneficial = advantageous or helpful; Something that is beneficial helps people or improves their lives.
- interpret = to translate spoken words from one language into another; to believe that something has particular meaning; If you interpret something in a particular way, you decide that this is its meaning or significance.

imply = to suggest that something is true, without saying this directly; to infer; to hint



- If you interpret something in a particular way, you decide that this is its meaning or significance.


- Mr. Kim **interpreted** for Bert, who could not speak a word of Korean.

- to suggest that something is true, without saying this directly;
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
- A smile does not always **imply** that someone is happy.


