exemplary = excellent and providing a good example for people to follow

confer = to discuss something with other people, so that everyone can
express their opinions and decide on something

internal = inside something

- neutral = not expressing any strong opinion or feeling; not supporting any of the people or groups involved in an argument or disagreement
- mental = relating to the state or health of someone's mind; relating to the mind and thinking

exemplary

DEFINITION:

 excellent and providing a good example for people to follow

SAMPLE SENTENCES:

- The staff provides **exemplary** service for their customers.
- The child's father showed exemplary patience.
- An **exemplary** leader cares for his people.



 to discuss something with other people, so that everyone can express their opinions and decide on something

SENTENCES

- The principal **conferred** with the students about the new safety rules.
- The doctors will **confer** to figure out why the patient is sick.
- At the Yalta Conference, President Roosevelt **conferred** with the leaders of England and Russia about their plans for Germany.

internal

DEFINITION:

inside something;

inside the body;

within a company or country rather than outside of it

SENTENCES

• In Biology class, we dissected a frog to examine its **internal** organs.

• In Geology class, we studied the **internal** structure of the earth.

neutral

DEFINITION:

not expressing any strong opinion or feeling;

not supporting any of the people or groups involved in an argument or disagreement;

a country that is neutral does not support any of the countries involved in a war

SENTENCES

• Bob tried to remain **neutral** when Betty and Bert argued.

• Switzerland was **neutral** during World War 2 and did not support either side.



 relating to the health or state of someone's mind

SENTENCES

- A mental illness is a condition that affects a person's thinking, feeling, or mood.
- A counselor can help you understand how to improve your mental health.

evanescent = Something that is evanescent does not last very long and gradually fades from memory

- **decline** = a decrease in the quality, quantity, or importance of something; to politely refuse to accept something or to do something
- **license** = to give official permission for someone to do or produce something, or for an activity to take place; a document that indicates that official permission or authorization has been given
- = something that happens or exists in society, science, or nature; something phenomenon that is studied because it is difficult to understand



fee = an amount of money that you pay to do something or that you pay to a professional person for their work

evanescent

DEFINITION:

 Something that is evanescent does not last very long and gradually fades from memory. SAMPLE SENTENCES:

- Rainbows are evanescent because they do not stay around for a long time.
- The life of the adult mayfly is evanescent as they only live for 24 hours.



 a decrease in the quality, quantity, or importance of something

SENTENCES

• With more people vaccinated, there has been a **decline** in new COVID cases.

 to politely refuse to accept something or to do something • Bert was offered a new job, but he **declined** to take it.

license

DEFINITION:

 to give official permission for someone to do or produce something, or for an activity to take place;

SENTENCES

• The vaccine has been **licensed** by the US Food and Drug Administration.

 a document that indicates that official authorization or permission has been given • Bert was happy to get his driver's **license**.

phenomenon

DEFINITION:

 something that happens or exists in society, science, or nature;

 something that is studied because it is difficult to understand

SENTENCES

- Many science fiction stories have been written about the UFO phenomenon.
- The phenomenon of the Bermuda Triangle has caused many to wonder why so many ships and airplanes have disappeared there.



 an amount of money that you pay to do something or that you pay to a professional person for their work

SENTENCES

• Residents can use the fitness center for a fee of \$15 per month.

exasperation

DEFINITION:

 when you feel annoyed because someone continues to do something that upsets you

SAMPLE SENTENCES:

 After waiting forever at the drive-thru window, Betty threw up her hands in exasperation and drove away.

• Many people express exasperation with the always changing Covid guidelines.

acknowledge

DEFINITION:

- to admit or accept that something is true;
- to show someone that you have noticed them or heard what they have said

SENTENCES

- When the teacher caught him, Bert acknowledged that he had cheated on the test.
- The queen **acknowledged** the crowd of people with a wave and a smile.

exceed

DEFINITION:

 to be more than a particular number or amount;

- SENTENCES
- He was fined for **exceeding** the speed limit.

 to go beyond what the rules or laws say you are allowed to do • Working hours should not **exceed** 40 hours per week.



 a nervous or worried feeling that makes it impossible for you to relax;

SENTENCES

• Tension in the neck muscles can cause headaches.

• There was a lot of **tension** in the rope before it broke.

 the amount of force that stretches something



SENTENCES

- to make known something that was previously secret or unknown;
- The truth was **revealed** when the curtain was opened.

 to show something that was previously hidden • Doctors are not allowed to reveal confidential medical information.
