

International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme



The International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme aims to develop students who have excellent bredth and depth of knowledge - students who flourish physically, intellectually, emotionally and ethically.

The Diploma Programme is made up of six groups and the DP Core, comprising of Theory of Knowledge (TOK), Creativity, Activity, Service (CAS), and the Extended Essay.

Through the Diploma Programme core, students reflect on the nature of knowledge, complete independent research and undertake a project that often involves community service.

The Diploma Programme is recognized and respected by the world's leading universities, and evidence suggests that higher rates of Diploma Programme students go on to university and higher education study than non-IB students.

The IB assesses students in a variety of ways, including external and internal assessments. Students will take end of course exams and these exams work as direct evidence of achievement against the stated goals of each of the courses. These exams are externally marked by an offical IB Marker and students will be informed of their earned mark for each course in June of the examination period. Studetns will also have internal assessments for each of the coruses they choose. Each course will have an assessment that is marked by the teacher of that course and submitted to the IB for moderation to ensure quality, authenticity and accuracy of marking by teachers. The combination of the internal and external assessments will result in a grade out of 7.

Studies in Language and Literature

Language A: Literature

Students will focus exclusively on literary texts, adopting a variety of approaches to textual criticism. Students explore the nature of literature, the aesthetic function of literary language and textuality, and the relationship between literature and the world. Students will study essential elements of literature and performance and explore their dynamic relationship. In the course, students will synthesize conventional literary analysis with the practical, aesthetic and symbolic elements of performance.

Students will study a total of 13 works in the Literature Higher Level course: minimum of four works in translation, a minimum of five works originally written in English, and four works freely chosen.

Language Acquisition

Spanish SL or French SL

The language acquisition courses designed to provide student with the necessary skills and intercultural understanding to enable them to communicate successfully in an environment where the language ied is spoken stud-These courses develop students' linguistic abilities through development of receptive, productive and interactive skills.

Spanish or French ab initio SL

The ab initio course follows all the same design as Spanish SL and French SL, however the ab intio course is a for a student that has no prior learning courses in the desired course of study.

Individuals and Societies

Global Politics SL

The course explores fundamental political concepts such as power, equality, sustainability and peace in a range of contexts. It allows students to develop an understanding of the local, national, international and global dimensions of political activity and processes, as well as to explore political issues affecting their own lives.

History of the Americas Higher Level

The history course is a world history course based on a comparative and multi-perspective approach to history. It involves the study of a variety of types of history, including political, economic, social and cultural, and provides a balance of structure and flexibility. The course emphasizes the importance of encouraging students to think historically and to develop historical skills as well as gaining factual knowledge. It pus a premium of developing the skills of critical thinking, and on developing an understanding of multiple interpretations of history.

Sciences

Biology HL

The coruse is designed to focus on essential ideas of cell and molecular biology, genetics, ecology, evoluation and diversity, and human physiology. The higher level concepts are nucleic acids, metabolism, plant biology, and animal physiology.

Physics SL

The IB Physics coures is designed to focus on observation and models, specifically studying measurements, mechanics, thermal, waves, electricity, circular motion, atomic, nuclear, and partical physics.

Sports Exercise and Health Science SL

This is an experimental science course that combines academic study, practical and investigative skills. Study includes anatomy, energy systems, exercise physiology, sports skill, friction and drag, sgenetics and athletic performance.



Mathematics

Mathematics: Analysis and Approaches

The course recognizes the need for analytical expertise in a world where innovation is increasingly depended on a deep understanding of mathematics. Theis course includes topics that are both traditionally part of a pre-university mathematics course (for example, functions, trigonometry, calculus) as well as topics that are amenable to investigation, conjecture and proof, for the instance the study of sequences and series.

This course allows the use of technology, as fluency in relevant mathematical software and hand-held technology is important regardless of choice of course. However, Mathematics: Analysis and Approaches has a strong emphasis on the ability to construct, communicate and justify correct mathematical arguments.

The Arts

Film HL

The IB Film coure aims to develop students as proficient interpreters and maks of film text. Through the study and analysis of film texts, and through practical exercises in film production. Students experiment with film and multimedia technology, acquiring the skills and creative competencies required to successfully communcate through the language of the medium.

Music SL

This course introduces students to a wide range of music from familiar and unfamiliar contexts that expands their horizons and provides new and exciting musical stimuli for their own work.

The Arts

Visual Arts HL

The course focuses on human creativity, expression, communication and understanding. Students will experience working with a variety of different art-making and conceptual froms. Higher Level students will experience working with at least three art-making forms such as drawing, painting, carved structure, ceramics, lens media, digital based graphics.

Additional Information

IB Diploma Students

Students who elect to pursue and IB Diploma, will have to select classes to meet the requirements. Of the six subjects, students must select one class from each of the subject groups. IB Diploma students must also select three Higher Level (HL) classes.

IB Diploma students will also complete an Extended Essay, take a Theory of Knowledge course their Junior year, and participate in Creativity, Activity, Service, while compleing an online portfolio. Example shedules are included.

IB Course Students

For some students, elected to persue the full IB Diploma is not the best fit. Studetns are still allowed to choose individual IB subjects. For instance a student could only take IB Literature if they enjoy that subject and wish to be challenged at the highest level.

College Credit and Frequently Asked Questions

Students are eligible to earn college credit upon completion of IB classes and receiving their final IB Scores after exams are taken in May of their senior year. Each individual college or university has their own requirements for student scores to earn college credit, however for the most part a score of 5 or higher is required in an IB course.

IB courses are scored out of 7 and based on a combination of internal and externally graded assessments. A full IB Diploma student will be pursuing a total score out of 45. Each student takes 6 classes, scored out of 7 possible marks. Each student can also earn 3 bonus points based on quality of ther Extended Essay and Theory of Knowledge course.
