Language Access Updates

The shift to distance learning has been creating a unique challenge for millions of parents across the U.S. Among them are EL parents who face additional challenges when they are thrust into the role of their children's primary educators and are expected to keep them on track despite their own limited English proficiency in many cases.

While for many school districts throughout the nation the task of providing language access might be a new major adjustment during these schools' closures, here, at Saint Louis Public Schools ESOL Office, we continue assisting our EL families in keeping schools and students connected during the virtual learning experience as usual, only with much higher volume. During school closure, the SLPS Access team performs around 1300 service requests a week. Major daily requests are assisting students, parents, and SLPS staff in navigating variety of online platforms.

The ESOL language access services, such as interpreting for a meeting (through a 3-way calls or Zoom), recording robocalls in multiple languages, document translation, personalized phone calls (and sight translation) in various languages and emergency calls assistance offered prior to spring break, remain the same.



ELevate 2020 Content Strands:

Assessment and Accountability

This content strand focuses on how to measure and evaluate student growth and/or ways to ensure English Language programs, teachers and students are working productively.

Possible presentation topics include: ideas for formative assessment; ways to provide students with feedback on language and content learning; preparing students for the ACCESS test or state testing; setting student language goals; ideas for evaluating EL programs, etc.

Culturally Relevant Teaching and Biliteracy

This content strand focuses on strategies and initiatives that foster academic success while connecting to the cultural and linguistic backgrounds of students.

Possible presentation topics include: helping students earn the Missouri Seal of Biliteracy; creating culturally relevant lessons in different content areas; multilingual school libraries; strategies for translanguaging as pedagogy, etc.

Effective Instructional Practices for English Learners

This content strand focuses on successful strategies to integrate language learning and literacy across content areas. Possible presentation topics include: student engagement; strategies for differentiation; ideas for developing student academic discourse skills; embedding technology; writing and presenting content and language objectives; content-based language objectives; project-based learning, etc.

Resources for Student and Family Support

This content strand focuses on how school structures or community organizations can help meet the social, emotional, academic or health-related needs of immigrant, refugee and/or English Learner students and their families.

Possible presentation topics include: programs promoting social-emotional learning; effective counseling practices; collaborative partnerships with community organizations; successful family engagement initiatives, etc.

Specific Populations

This content strand focuses on ways to support English Learner students that belong to a particular category such as ELs with IEPs, ELs in Early Childhood, Newcomers, ELs in Gifted programs, etc.
