The most recent WIDA research collaboration projects: Building knowledge about how to support the academic and social success of multilingual learners

ALTELLA

Researchers in the Alternate English Language Learner Assessment (ALTELLA) project seek to better understand how to apply lessons learned from research on successful instructional practices, accommodations, and assessing English language learners (ELLs) and students with cognitive disabilities to develop an alternate English language proficiency assessment for these students.

They are using these findings to develop an evidence-centered design approach to inform the future developments related to alternate English language proficiency assessments. ALTELLA was funded by the U.S. Department of Education and established a partnership of five state departments of education – some from the WIDA Consortium – and the Wisconsin Center for Education Research. WIDA is using project findings to inform developments regarding Alternate ACCESS for ELLs. Visit the <u>ALTELLA website</u> to learn more.

Doing and Talking Math and Science

Through the Doing and Talking Math and Science project, researchers and educators worked together to develop instructional resources that support all students in simultaneously doing and talking about science and mathematics. This research, funded by the National Science Foundation, is grounded in the premise that learning math and science means learning how to think in particular ways, how to argue from evidence, and use language to explain and analyze what you understand. When we help our students engage in these practices by facilitating their discussions of complex ideas, we provide multiple opportunities for all our students to become more effective users of English. WIDA Early Years Parent Research

In partnership with three WIDA Early Years Member States – Maryland, Minnesota, and Pennsylvania – WIDA is conducting research that explores the perceptions and decision-making of parents of young multilingual children, ages 0-5 years, with regard to children's language learning and development, family engagement, and children's participation in early care and education (ECE) programs. This research will provide information to state partners, and the broader field, about how to strengthen approaches to engaging with families of multilingual children.
