

Ancient Egypt and two months of study in a unit on Ancient Egypt are celebrated on Wednesday, March 10, 2010 in Ms. Norris' 6th Grade Home Room. Ms. Norris (far right) worked with members of Metro Theater Company bringing a special program to students combining speech, drama, and problem solving skills to explore the life and culture of Ancient Egypt.



Students learned how to play the ancient Egyptian game called Sennett. They paired off and played the game against one another in a series of matches leading to a championship series. The students used math skills to track all the matches and display the standings with tables, charts and graphs. Later, they displayed the results on the bulletin board.



Ms. Norris helps students track the results of their tournament play and demonstrates how to graph the results. The activity was only one of the many that involved the class in hands-on tasks related to ancient Egyptian culture. You may notice Ms. Norris' headdress which she wore in the spirit of the times. The students were engaged and enjoyed the lessons.

Norris and Phoenix have planned similar assignments in the past and hope the students continue to see the connection between their written work and the technical skills they are developing in computer class.









To encourage staff to take a more active roll in managing their own health and wellness, the District instituted a Wellness Program in concert with the District's Employee Health Care Provider. On February 24, 2010 medical professionals came to Lyon @ Blow at the conclusion of the school day and set up testing stations in the First Floor Computer lab. They measured your teacher's height, weight, body mass, blood pressure and cholesterol. In the insert above you'll see one of the health care workers take a sample of Ms. Harringa's blood. The samples were run through machines on the spot to indicate the degree of employee "wellness" based on the cholesterol, blood sugar and other factors. Most of the teachers and staff were very glad to get the information.




# TEACH FOR AMERICA REGIONAL VISIT








Student height and weight are measured. Students also had their blood pressure taken to assess the student population's general physical health.




