Students at Lyon at Blow are learning to read for deep meaning. They are learning to write based on careful analysis of details and sound organizational principles. The following essay was created by 8th grade student, Armoni Fields, and reflects her close reading of Maya Angelou's poem, "Alone."

MAYA ANGELOU'S "ALONE"

In the poem "alone" by Maya Angelou, there are a lot of emotions, meanings, and figurative language. You can really see how hurt the speaker feels. She feels very strongly about coming together and making a change. She feels alone in this world, and she thinks that our brothers and sisters cannot survive without the help of each other; but we are forgetting that. She feels that without each other, money is of no use. She wants us to know that nobody, but nobody, can make it out here alone.

"Alone" is about a person who is very lonely and tired of everyone only caring for themselves without thinking twice about helping one another. In the poem, the speaker talks about the rich people who can't even use their money, so their wives complain. Meanwhile, there are poor people and sad children; even their own children are lonely. She also talks about how careless they are with their hearts of stone. But the speaker is looking for a solution to all of this because even rich people get lonely, and money can't buy you happiness. Instead of trying to make money, we need to make bonds and friends. If we don't come together, the world will only get worse, and times will get much harder. The speaker is a very lonely person, who was just up thinking one night. She feels alone, and once again, we need to help each other, and everybody needs somebody.

The theme of this poem is that, once again, nobody can make it out in this world alone. I know this because the poet/ speaker talks about this repeatedly throughout the poem. She constantly talks about how we all need each other. She says that that even the rich get lonely, which I believe to be very true. Some things that give off hints of the theme are when she says "Nobody, but nobody, can make it out here alone" and "the race of man is suffering", and even when she says "They've got expensive doctors, to cure their hearts of stone". When I put all of these

clues together, I came to realization that the theme is that nobody can make it in this world alone.

In "Alone", Maya Angelou used a lot of different types of figurative language. Probably the most I've seen in one poem. She used rhyme when she said "how to find myself a home, where water is not thirsty, where bread is not stone,". She used personification when she said "hearts of stone" because hearts aren't stone, but she's saying that they are careless. The last thing I saw was an allusion, and it was tricky to figure out. When she said "where water is not thirsty, where bread is not stone" she was referring to biblical days. As you can see, Maya Angelou used a great number of figurative language techniques.

"Alone" is by far the most touching poem by Maya Angelou to me. It is one of the best because I can really understand what she's saying and relate. I can relate because sometimes I sit and think about the things that are going on in this world too. The theme is that nobody can make it alone in this world. It's an excellent theme and motto. I loved how she used an allusion to biblical times. After reading, I felt like making a change because even I depend on others sometimes because it's true that nobody, but nobody, can make it out here alone.





New computers, increased bandwidth, and more Internet drops for the Lyon at Blow Computer Literacy Classroom.




Mr. Hennen and Ms. Davison stand in for a picture at the start of the Read Across America assembly on March 1, 2013.



NO BULLYING
