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SLPS Seeks Voter Approval for Improved Facilities

hen St. Louis residents go to the polls on August 3rd, they will have an opportunity to cast a vote on improving St. Louis Public Schools facilities. Proposition S, a **NO TAX INCREASE** \$155 Million Bond issue, will appear on the ballot.

The Special Administrative Board voted unanimously to place Proposition S on the ballot after conducting a public engagement process known as FACTS, which stands for Facilities Advisory Committee for Tomorrow's Schools. Through the FACTS process, a facilitating team of parents, staff and community members gathered information from thousands of stakeholders regarding improving the District's school facilities.

Proposition S funds will be dedicated to improving academic performance, providing a safe environment and promoting a healthy lifestyle for students. Among the specific improvements funded by Proposition S will be access to a computer for every student, improved security systems at school buildings, and renovated kitchens to allow for hot lunch programs for children. Proposition S Buildings Repair and Facilities Improvement

Local labor officials have estimated that Proposition S will create approximately 3,100 construction-related jobs in the St. Louis community.

Proposition S funds may only be used to improve facilities and may not be used for day-to-day operating expenses such as salaries, supplies or transportation.

Superintendent's Corner

Choose St. Louis Public Schools

As a new school year draws near, I'd like to personally thank you for choosing to send your child to St. Louis Public Schools. The District made many positive strides in 2009-2010, and we



will continue our focus on improving academics this school year.

Our priorities for 2010-2011 are as follows: Academics, Enhanced Post-Secondary Support, Highly Qualified Staff and Core Improvements. Briefly, here's our plan for each of the priority areas:

ACADEMICS

• A five-phase **Reading Improvement Plan** focusing on professional development, student reading assessments, and student health assessments will be implemented to boost student reading levels. Key components provide intervention in the classroom and parent resources to have all students in grades 3-9 reading at level within three years.

• School Improvement Plans at 16 district schools identified by the State of Missouri as being among the 52 lowest performing schools in the state. Funded by federal School Improvement Grants, the school improvement plans include curriculum, assessment and staffing overhauls, as well as significant staffing changes.

• Gifted School Expansion to accommodate the growing need for gifted elementary education in the City of St. Louis and surrounding areas. Current plans will grow Mallinckrodt Academy to include a gifted kindergarten class in 2010-2011, with an additional grade added each year until 2016. The school will be modeled after the gifted programs at Kennard Classical Leadership Academy, currently operating at 101.5% capacity.

ENHANCED POST-SECONDARY SUPPORT

• An individualized four-year academic plan will be developed for each high school student to align graduation requirements and state academic standards to academic interests and course selections.

HIGHLY QUALIFIED STAFF

• A **Principal Leadership Program**, similar to the St. Louis Plan for teachers, will be developed for principals leading schools with low academic achievement for three consecutive years or that have limited

SLPS Applies for School Improvement Grants

During the 2009-2010 school year, the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education identified 21 St. Louis Public Schools as eligible for the School Improvement Grant (SIG) program. SLPS is seeking SIG funding for 17 of the 21 schools for the 2010-11 school year. Through the SIG program, the United States Education Department (USED) requires state educational agencies (SEAs) to use three tiers to prioritize funding to local educational agencies (LEAs) with the lowest-achieving schools that have the greatest need and demonstrate the strongest commitment to use the funds to significantly raise the achievement of their students. It is USED's expectation that SIG funds are used for the implementation of one of four rigorous school intervention models:

1. TURNAROUND MODEL

- Replace the principal and rehire no more than 50 percent of the staff. Grant the new principal sufficient operational flexibility (including staffing, calendars/time, and budgeting) to implement fully a comprehensive approach to substantially improve student outcomes
- Participating Schools: Ashland, Columbia, Hamilton, Mann, Sigel, Sumner, Vashon and Walbridge

2. RESTART SCHOOL MODEL

 Convert a school or close and reopen it under a charter school operator, a charter management organization, or an education management organization that has been selected through a rigorous review process
 Participating Schools: none

3. CLOSURE MODEL

- Close a school and enroll students in other schools in the LEA that are higher achieving
- Participating School: Bunche International Studies

4. TRANSFORMATIONAL MODEL

- Implement each of the following strategies: (1) replace the principal with a highly capable principal with either a track record of transformation or clear potential to successfully lead a transformation (although the LEA may retain a recently hired principal where a turnaround, restart, or transformation was instituted in the past two years, and there is tangible evidence that the principal has the skills necessary to initiative dramatic change); (2) institute comprehensive instructional reforms; (3) increase learning time and create community-oriented schools; and (4) provide operational flexibility and sustained support
- Participating Schools: Carr Lane, Central VPA, Fanning, Gateway Middle, Jefferson,

DESE will provide LEAs with SIG grants to facilitate implementation of one of the four school intervention models. LEAs will be able to receive from \$50,000 up to \$2 million per school to implement a model selected by the LEA and approved by the SEA. This funding is contingent on the LEA's demonstrated capacity to implement the selected models and an approved application and budget that includes sufficient funds to implement the selected intervention model fully and effectively in each school.

Title I School Improvement Grants are funded by \$546.6 million in the fiscal year 2009 appropriation and an additional \$3 billion from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) to support

Asbestos Management Plan Availability

Asbestos containing building materials (ACBM) are present within various schools throughout the district. In accordance with the Federal Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA), an accredited inspector and management planner have completed a review of the locations, quantities and friability of the asbestos containing materials and have prepared an assessment and response action plan to reduce exposure to asbestos fibers.

Two copies of the asbestos program for all schools, which includes current

inspection reports, are located in the Operations Office located at 801 North 11th Street, St. Louis, Missouri and one copy is also required to be kept at the school itself.

The plan is available to the public for inspection without cost or restriction within five working days after receiving a written request for inspection. Hours of availability and a copy of the form, "Request for Inspection of Asbestos Program," will be provided upon request.

Should a request be made for a copy of the report or parts of the report, SLPS may charge up to \$0.25 per page to make copies of the plan.

The St. Louis Public School District is required to inform parents of students attending Title I schools that they can request certain information, according to the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (Public Law 107-110).

Upon parents' request, the St. Louis Public School District is required to provide parents/guardians, in a timely manner, the following information:

- Whether their child's teacher has met state qualification and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction.
- Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which state qualification or licensing criteria has been waived.
- What baccalaureate degree major the teacher has and any other graduate certification or degree major held by the teacher and the field of discipline of the certification.

In addition to the information that parents may request, the St. Louis Public School District must provide to the parent/guardian:

- Information on the achievement level of their child in the state academic assessments as required.
- Timely notice that their child has been assigned, or has been taught for four or more consecutive weeks, by a teacher who is not highly qualified.
- Notification if the District or their child's school has been identified for school improvement, and options available for their child.
- A Complaint Resolution Procedure annually (SLPS Complaint Resolution Procedure information is listed in SLPS Student Code of Conduct Handbook).
- Notification to parents of the option to transfer their student if student is enrolled in an identified persistently dangerous school, or student has been the victim of a criminal offense while on school property to a school not identified.

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Pettus Foundation Awards For Excellence

In December 2007, the Pettus Foundation pledged a three-year \$330,000 grant to the St. Louis Public Schools Foundation to support a program that honors outstanding St. Louis Public School (SLPS) teachers and principals for their accomplishments in classrooms and schools. The Awards of Excellence program recognizes teachers who demonstrate excellence in teaching by inspiring all students to achieve and who have the respect and admiration of their students, parents and colleagues. They must also play an active role in creating a positive culture in their school. Outstanding SLPS principals who inspire staff and students to achieve and who have the respect and admiration of their teachers, students, parents and colleagues are also recognized. The goal of the program is to honor and promote the work and educational methods that are succeeding and inspire others to replicate that success. Every teacher and principal in the district is eligible to be nominated for the award.

A panel of 62 judges consisting of retired St. Louis Public School teachers and principals conducted a thorough selection process by reviewing the nomination packets and selecting teachers and principals whom the judges observed firsthand in their respective schools. The judges then selected finalists for interviews and used a point system in choosing the winners.

One teacher, judged as the most outstanding, is chosen from each SLPS elementary, middle, and high school and awarded a \$1,000 cash prize. Eight principals judged as the most outstanding are also awarded \$1,000 each. The winning teachers and principals also receive a plaque to be prominently displayed in their school and a desktop award for their office or classroom. A Certificate of Excellence is presented to each non-winning semifinalist.

For 2009-2010, the third year of the program, eight principals and 73 teachers from among a total of more than 200 finalists received the Awards of Excellence and the \$1,000 cash prize.

Principals were honored with their awards in the presence of their peers at the SLPS year-end principals' meeting on May 27, while the teacher awards were presented during special recognition programs and award ceremonies at their schools. The Pettus Awards of Excellence for 2009-2010 will be announced publicly in August 2010.

A culture of learning has been established at Dunbar Elementary that creates a positive climate so that the teachers, parents, and students can achieve.

Another strength that has helped our school become successful is the family atmosphere and "everyone" pitching in attitude. On any given day you may see me sweeping or mopping the floor, wiping off tables, assisting with breakfast or lunch duties, answering the phone, visiting classrooms, watching a class, talking to a parent, or working with students. I don't ask the staff to complete any task that I am not willing to do myself. It takes all of us working together to make our school successful and no job is more important than the other.

Motivating students is a major part of my responsibilities, and I try to be the most enthusiastic cheerleader around by challenging students to reach beyond their ordinary efforts.

As a parent, I understand the significance of parental involvement for children's academic success. In this age of accountability, adequate yearly progress, and achievement gaps, I look beyond the traditional ways parents were involved – bake sales, classroom parties, or chaperoning events. While this type of support is valuable and needed, I have found that my students benefit even more when I collaborate with my parents to help empower their children to succeed and reach their individual goals.

I respect my students and I listen to their feedback. I plan my lessons to connect creative projects to students' personal ideas and concerns. I give the students choices, emphasizing learning styles.

I routinely reflect on my students, my methods, and my materials and I adapt my lessons to meet student needs. It is wonderful to have good methodologies, but it is even better to have students engaged in good learning. To this end, I give helpful and frequent feedback, and I use scoring guides to assess their learning.

I believe that all students can learn to do whatever is necessary to improve their lives. I have discovered that teachers and students will work hard for you when they know you care about them. Students with whom I interact on a daily basis know me as someone who helps them build on their own strengths.

For example, student attendance is not as strong on Friday. With my encouragement, students decided to organize a student leadership team and promote school-wide activities every Friday. "Free Style Friday" was created. This activity promotes writing, literacy, and a positive school culture. Students are responsible for setting up teams to "rap" against each other. "Free Style Friday" became an activity for participation by all students – 100 percent. Attendance has improved greatly on Fridays – lending credence that when there are activities that promote positive school culture, students will come.

Another important approach I use to connect with students is conducting home visits. Home visitations have allowed me to not only connect to the culture of the student, but also families of the students.

Teachers must adapt and change to meet the continuing needs of students.

When teachers focus on learning like they expect of their students, they can enhance their students' educational experience. If teachers do not have high expectations and strive to teach at higher levels, how can students be expected to achieve at those higher levels? As teachers push the students to the more difficult work, they instill confidence and knowledge that the students can tackle the next challenge that faces them.

Education must be relevant to the student and to today. Students today need to see a relevance to what they learn. My students start each day with a journal prompt on which they write. Usually the prompt addresses a current situation or something with which the students are familiar. By catching their attention with an example they understand, I work backward to show how a similar event took place in American history. Through building in relevance into a lesson, students grasp a more complete understanding.

that not all children learn in the same manner. It is for this reason that I incorporate a number of teaching strategies into my lessons. Concept maps, open-ended questioning, modeling, and asking students to paraphrase what I have said are all techniques I use in my classroom. Alternative forms of assessment are also implemented in my teaching. While writing about investigations that have taken place in the science laboratory is a common occurrence, student presentations, role playing and one-on-one conversations are also used to assess learning. Scoring guides are almost always provided to students before they begin working on an activity and GLEs are introduced at the inception of new concepts.

It has been my experience that if teachers set high expectations for students and then convey the belief that the boys and girls can succeed at tasks assigned, students, regardless of grade level, will rise to the occasion. It has only been through the practice of reflection that I have been able to reach this conclusion. have the responsibility of ensuring that my students are successful both academically and emotionally.

In addition, I set high expectations for my students. It is amazing to see what students can accomplish when they know someone else believes in them. I encourage my students to challenge themselves as well.

I am constantly reflecting on what I can do differently to increase student achievement. I also feel it is important for students to be reflective about their learning. It is important for students to be able to gauge their learning and set goals for themselves. At the end of every school day my students record their reflections in competence journals. These reflections include something specific that the students have learned as well as their favorite part of the school day. These journals are beneficial because they give me insight to how students view the learning that takes place in our classroom.

An ideal school consists of a community of learners whose main focus is student achievement. High standards are set, and high achievement is demanded. Staff members establish high expectations for all students, and provide the support necessary for them to achieve their goals.

A positive school climate is crucial to its success. The atmosphere of a school should be one of caring and trust. The school should be a supportive environment that is conducive to learning. Both students and staff should feel comfortable and safe at their school. Positive interpersonal relationships also help create a positive school culture. These relationships are fostered when both staff and students are encouraged to work collaboratively. An effective staff will work together to create a safe and supportive learning environment.

The students are the most important members of a school community. Under the appropriate conditions and with the appropriate strategies, all students can and will learn. The nature and quality of learning experiences must be exemplary. Student performance must be evaluated frequently. Achievement data should be analyzed and instruction should be planned, accordingly. All of these efforts will help students succeed.

Schools should solicit the active involvement of parents and community leaders in school functions. Community resources should be sought and used often. Collaboration and communication with families and the community are crucial to the success of a school. Parents can provide valuable and necessary information and they must be valued and respected. They should be welcomed and encouraged to become involved in their child's education. Opportunities should be provided for parents to work with their children in learning settings. An open line of communication will help build trust and collaboration between school and home.

School leaders must have high expectations and strive for greatness. They must focus on leading as well as managing. They must be both a good business manager and an effective instructional leader. A balance must be found between instructional leadership, routine administration, and human relations. Time is limited, and must be used effectively, with priorities set on instructionally related matters. Effective leaders foster open communication, decision-making, and problem solving. They are able to lead people toward personal and organizational goals.

Emily Jackson

Third Grade Teacher, Dewey International Studies School

The key to reaching students and being truly effective is building a genuine relationship with each student, knowing their likes, goals, aspirations, family life, and personality quirks. This type of knowledge about students allows the teacher to set class boundaries and expectations, while also knowing where each child falls on the spectrum of guidance that he or she may need. It has always been my philosophy that fair is truly about giving each child what he or she needs in all areas of development. Having an atmosphere where students want to work creates an independent expansion of knowledge and skills. For example, one of the integral parts of my reading curriculum is to use differentiated centers while working in small groups. Each center includes different activities on the same topic. They are created so that students can choose their first activity at each center, but must continue down the list of activities if they finish early. This way, students have the option to choose something that may be easy for them, but they will also have to be challenged once they finish.

Jennifer Carter

Orthopedically Handicapped Teacher, Gateway Michael School

My students are important to me. I see them as individuals with unique gifts to give the world, and it is my duty to make sure the world receives those gifts. The tone and atmosphere in my classroom is set-up to prepare my students for life beyond the walls of the school building. I realize that one day they will be adults, and the world may not accept the uniqueness about them, so I have to motivate my students to bring out their best. I want the focus to be on their talents and abilities, not on their disabilities.

I study my students and build a rapport with them to find out who they are, where they come from, and what it will take to lift them to a higher level of thinking. I refuse to accept excuses for not attempting a task. I engage the students in fun – functional learning activities that meet them where they are academically but also challenge them. I am a strong believer that learning should be fun as well as stimulating. The students participate in physical exercises that incorporate brain fitness that help keep them motivated during instruction.

My style is to be firm when I have to be, loving when I need to be, and fun when things get rough. I believe in my students. As educators, it is our job to prepare students for the best and worst in life; they depend on us to equip them for what is ahead.

- 1. Monetary compensation for services, including wages, salary, commissions, or fees;
- 2. Net income from non-farm self-employment;
- 3. Net income from farm self-employment;
- 4. Social security;
- 5. Dividends or interest on savings or bonds or income from estates or trusts;
- 6. Net rental income;

- 7. Public assistance or welfare payments;
- 8. Unemployment compensation;
- 9. Government civilian employee or military retirement, or pensions, or veterans payments;
- 10. Private pensions or annuities;
- 11. Alimony or child support payments;
- 12. Regular contributions from persons not living in the household;
- 13. Net royalties; and
- 14. Other cash income. Other cash income would include cash amounts received or withdrawn from any source including savings, investments, trust accounts, and other resources which would be available to pay the price of a child's meal.

Income does not include any income or benefits received under any Federal program, which are excluded from consideration as income by any legislative prohibition.

School Bus Rules

iding the school bus is a privilege – not a right. Improper behavior may result in a student being removed from riding the bus either on a temporary or permanent basis. Any offense committed by a student on a districtowned or contracted bus shall be punished in the same manner as if the offense had been committed at the student's assigned school. The bus is an extension of the classroom and misbehavior will not be tolerated. Two (2) digital cameras are on every bus to record the activity that occurs throughout the bus and at the bus door.

1. The bus driver is in charge. Students **must** obey the driver. 2. Students are to ride their assigned busses.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

Waiting to Board a Bus

- 1. Arrive at the bus stop ten (10) minutes ahead of your scheduled time. The bus must leave at the designated time.
- 2. Wait until the bus stops.
- 3. Stand well away from the street as the bus approaches.
- 4. Form a quiet, uniform line to board.
- 5. Littering or damaging property on or near the bus stop is prohibited. Keep sidewalks clear of books, clothing and other articles.
- 6. Observe all rules of conduct governing student behavior (see the Student Rights and Responsibilities related to Conduct handbook).
- 7. **Report** to the principal, parent/guardian any suspicious persons or activities.
- 8. Remain with the group and do not talk to strangers or get into a stranger's car.

Riding the Bus

- 1. Be seated immediately and remain facing forward. Remain seated until the bus arrives at your stop and you receive instructions to unload.
- 2. Hold books and all personal items in your lap. Do not block the aisle.
- 3. Pets and animals of any kind are not permitted on the bus.
- 4. Extending arms, legs or head out of the bus is prohibited.
- 5. Throwing objects on the bus or out of the window is prohibited.
- 6. **Refrain** from distracting or talking to the bus driver except in an emergency.
- 7. Tampering with or damaging bus equipment is prohibited. Student and/or parent/ guardians will be held liable.

- 9. Smoking, eating and drinking are not permitted.
- 10. Place trash in receptacle provided near front of bus.
- 11. Use of profanity or obscene gestures is prohibited.
- 12. Bringing weapons or dangerous instruments of any kind is prohibited.
- 13. Be aware that the St. Louis Metropolitan Police may stop and search any school bus at any time for illegal items. Students found with weapons, liquor, drugs, etc. will be arrested.
- 14. Observe all rules of conduct governing student behavior.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF PARENTS

- 1. Read, discuss and review this handout AND the Transportation Section of the SCCH booklet.
- 2. Encourage your children to observe all established guidelines.
- 3. Get to know your bus driver.
- 4. **Report** to the Transportation Division (314-633-5100) any related traffic hazards of any school bus observed operating carelessly.
- 5. Report all observed misconduct on school busses and at school bus stops to the principal.
- 6. Place identification of your child where the bus driver can retrieve it, if necessary.
- 7. Report to the police any strangers observed at or near bus pick up/drop off points.

8. See that children are at the bus stop ten (10) minutes before the bus

- is scheduled to arrive.
- 9. Bus stop requests must be submitted in person to the school or at 801 N. 11th Street.
