CHARTER DEFINITION



A charter school is a free, independent public school that operates outside of a school district. Charter schools are granted greater flexibility in return for greater accountability. Missouri charter schools are governed by independent boards and are non-profit organizations.

DIFFERENCE BETWEEN CHARTER SCHOOLS AND TRADITIONAL PUBLIC SCHOOLS



- Charter schools are established by teachers, parents, principals, educational experts and entrepreneurs. The biggest difference is that no student is assigned to a charter school. Families choose to enroll their children in charter schools.
- Charter schools operate freed from some of the regulations of a school district. Charter schools are accountable to achieve the same state standards as school districts, but may choose to use different measures and timelines for reaching their goals. In exchange for flexibility, charters can be closed if they do not keep their performance promises.
- Charter schools are governed by non-profit boards and must comply with the conditions of their "charter" agreement and performance contract. Unlike elected district boards, charter school boards are appointed and operate under Missouri Statutes that regulate non-profit organizations.

WHERE CAN CHARTER SCHOOLS EXIST?



Charter schools can open and operate in all school districts in Missouri. The Missouri Charter Public School Commission can sponsor charter schools in Kansas City Public Schools district, Saint Louis Public Schools district, any unaccredited district and any district provisionally accredited for 3 or more years.

CHARTER SPONSORSHIP



There are three kinds of sponsors in Missouri: school boards of accredited districts, qualifying universities, and the Missouri Charter Public School Commission. Each sponsor sets their own policies and procedures for sponsorship. Sponsored charter schools must be approved by the Missouri State Board of Education and must meet all applicable state statutes and Department of Elementary and Secondary Regulations. Charters started in 2000-2001.

CHARTER PARTNERSHIPS



The Saint Louis Public Schools' (SLPS) Office of Charter Partnerships is guided forward by the District's comprehensive, long-range strategic plan, Transformation Plan 3.0. The Office supports efforts on behalf of the District to provide excellent school options for all students within the City of Saint Louis.

CHARTER PARTNERSHIPS



MAIN FUNCTIONS:

- Discussions/evaluations of proposals for charter schools, contract schools, and use of buildings.
- Recruitment of students/transfer of student records from closing charter schools.
- Participation in state-level legislative and administrative discussions with charter sponsors through the Missouri Charter Sponsor Support Network (MCSSN).
- □ Formation of and support for the Saint Louis Schools Collaborative (SLSC), a collaboration between administrative leaders of charter schools and SLPS to achieve quick and important wins in the areas of shared services, advocacy, and location planning.

SAINT LOUIS PUBLIC SCHOOLS and KIPP PARTNERSHIP



- □ The partnership paves the way for KIPP to have access to other empty school buildings in the city for future charter schools, potentially removing one of the largest stumbling blocks to opening a charter in St. Louis. KIPP officials already operate two schools within district facilities (KIPP Inspire Academy is located at the former Pruitt School in the Carr neighborhood, and KIPP Victory is located at the former Mitchell School in the West End neighborhood). KIPP officials also operate four additional charter schools not located within district facilities.
- □ In return, all attendance, enrollment and test score data collected at KIPP's St. Louis schools are reflected in the data of St. Louis Public Schools, potentially strengthening the performance of the city school system. To continue using the buildings, the KIPP schools need to meet certain performance standards.



SAINT LOUIS SCHOOLS COLLABORATIVE (SLSC) and CITY-WIDE PLAN

STATEMENT of PURPOSE



- The St. Louis Schools Collaborative (SLCS) is a collection of public school and educational leaders in the City of St. Louis who believe that better educational outcomes can be achieved for all children through collaboration with each other. Members currently include leaders of the Saint Louis Public Schools District, charter schools operating in St. Louis City, their University sponsors, and supportive parties who agree to this Statement of Purpose and Guiding Principles. Currently, the Collaborative is an informal collection of individuals with no legal standing or binding authority.
- As a participating member of the St. Louis Schools Collaborative, all members have voluntarily committed to accept the principles of this "Statement of Purpose" and to abide by the following "Guiding Principles" in both public and private actions.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES



The members of the St. Louis Schools Collaborative believe in the following principles that guide our work together, and we commit to abide by these principles, both publicly and privately:

- □ We believe all children in the City of St. Louis should be supported to achieve their highest potential, no matter which school they attend or in which neighborhood they live.
- □ We agree that higher educational outcomes for children should be at the center of all the decisions we make together.
- We agree that a role exists for both District and Charter schools to operate within St. Louis, and that collaboration between these entities is the best path to achieving greater educational outcomes for children in St. Louis.
- □ The members of the Collaborative agree to privately and publicly support each other's respective roles and missions, and we agree to actively seek ways to assist each other in achieving better outcomes for all students in St. Louis.
- □ When natural conflict arises between our institutions, we agree to seek to resolve issues through communication, collaboration, and compromise through the Collaborative structure.
- □ We believe that accurate and timely information is important for families and stakeholders to make informed decisions regarding the education of their children, and we agree to work together to provide reliable, timely, and easily understood information regarding public education in St. Louis through the Collaborative structure.

WHAT WE DO



The Collaborative seeks to provide leadership to the St. Louis community through collaborative dialogue and action by:

- Undertaking collaborative initiatives between the St. Louis Public Schools District (SLPS) and the charter schools operating in the city of St. Louis to achieve better educational outcomes for all children, regardless of which school they attend or in which neighborhood they live;
- □ Initiating dialogue, seeking input, and engaging the community on the issues of public education in the City of St. Louis;
- □ Gathering, filtering, and analyzing data, facts, and various points-of-view regarding public education in the City of St. Louis;
- □ Recommending changes to the current educational system, developing collective priorities, and coordinating areas of focus for action among SLPS and Charter schools;
- Building support for the changes through communication, education, and organizational support and commitment;
- □ Mobilizing and coordinating resources for achieving coordinated action to improve educational outcomes for all children in St. Louis;
- Developing vehicles for measurement and communication of success, long-term.
