



# St. Louis Public Schools and Public Charter Financial Analysis

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# Important Information

- <u>Data from DESE</u>; the ASBR (Annual Secretary of the Board Report) and other data sets
- Each district/charter will <u>interpret the accounting manual</u> and code slightly differently
- SLPS and KCPS are <u>accrual-based</u> systems while charters tend to use cash
- DESE <u>coding changes</u> as well as district coding corrections make historical comparison imperfect and challenging
- Experience & expertise varies thus data may be reported differently
- The pupil count used in the calculation is 2020-21 Enrollment

The purpose of this study is for awareness and understanding of the inefficiencies created by smaller schools inside single boundaries and their impact on instructional spending.

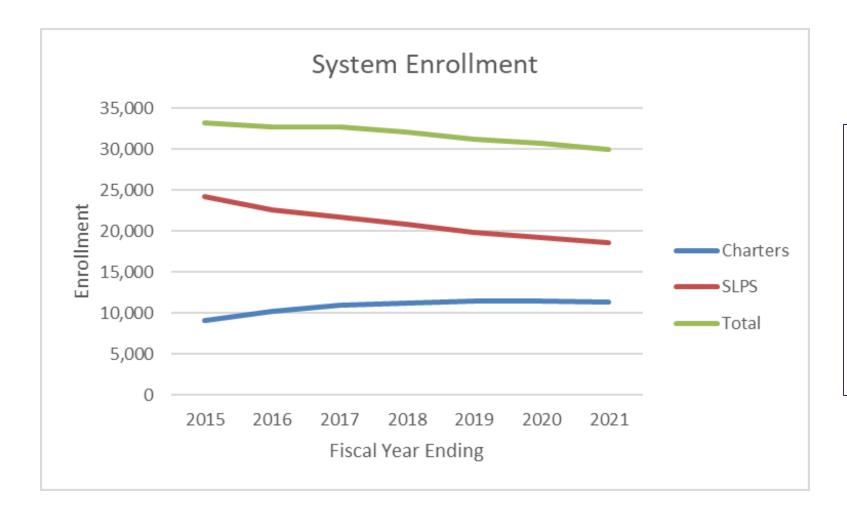

Charter Systems in Missouri are spending **2 times** for Executive Administration as Springfield

Executive Administration Costs include Executives, Community Relations, Labor Negotiations Staff and Costs, Administrative Technology Services.

The KC System spent \$189 more per pupil than Springfield (97%) and the SL System spends \$229 more per pupil (118%) in 2020-21.

\$266 more per pupil KC to Springfield Average admin salary is lowest in the SL System.

Springfield \$10.8 million **\$438 per pupil** 

KCPS -67 square miles

Springfield 137 –15% of charters do not provide transportation in KC.



#### Other Factors to Consider:

- 1) Inefficiency of choice model = reduced state funding due to the efficiency factor calculation.
- 2) Larger number of routes = need for more drivers and buses impacting cost and service.
- 3) Majority of charters not providing transportation in SL.



#### Greater Numbers of Facilities Impact on Operation of Plant Costs

Operation of Plant includes Maintenance, Custodial, Grounds, Utilities, Vehicle Maintenance, Building Leases and more

On average, the charter systems spend \$653 more on plant expense than Springfield.

Springfield \$5.5 million **\$237 per pupil** 

Only 5 KC charters and 2 SL charters had Bilingual costs in 2020-21.

Note the proportion in charters to traditional schools – who we serve drives cost and resources.

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# **Change in Charter Funding under HB 1552**



Charters in Missouri will receive over \$75 million more this year than last under 1552.

# From Here

Incorporate financial data to <u>inform the development of District Improvement Goals</u> in operations and student achievement.

Combine the Financial Study with Student Demographic & Achievement Data

Ask DESE/legislators to conduct an <u>impact analysis</u> in STL & KC before expansion now or replication/expansion into new markets

Require <u>needs assessment</u> of any charters proposed (prior to DESE approval of the charter)

Understand best practices recommendations – See Annenberg Institute for School Reform's Public Accountability for Charter Schools

Continue engaging Legislation on Equity Funding and Equity in Accountability



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
