Summer learning supports several key areas:

- □ Support scholars to recover unfinished as a result of COVID-19.
- Increasing opportunities for intervention and credit recovery, including scholars who qualify for summer learning through SB319.
- Decreasing the "opportunity gap" by providing enrichment programming, project-based learning and targeted Social Emotional Learning.

Lessons Learned in Summer 2021



- □ **High School Credit Recovery:** Move beyond compliance in Innovative Credit Recovery Programming. Hire certified teachers to serve as teachers of record to provide support, feedback, and grading in the appropriate content areas.
- □ Social Emotional Learning: Continue to support summer learning with counseling staff.
- □ **Summer Learning Sites:** Although there was high interest in maintaining site-based summer learning, staffing and transportation issues indicate that a return to a reduced site-list will be more effective and efficient.

- □ 1:1 Technology: All scholars attending Camp SLPS will have access to tech devices until the close of the program.
- Programming: Maintain a focus on Accelerated Learning, Literacy, Math, Social Emotional Learning (SEL), Counselors on Site, and Visual/Performing Arts. Add an element of fun and whole-child development with the inclusion of unique daily activities (Dance Breaks, Yoga, Arts/Crafts, Physical Education, Educational Gaming and Field Day/Field Trip Fridays)
- □ **Curriculum:** Implementation of a MLS-based accelerated learning program within a blended instructional framework that offers scholars an opportunity to engage with extended opportunities to learn at home.
- □ **Partnerships:** Springboard, Wolf-Trap, Craft Alliance, Aim High, Deaconess Foundation/Freedom School.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS or HOW YOU WILL DETERMINE SUCCESS



- □ Evidence of impact for Summer Learning in grades K-8 will be determined by scholar growth in **STAR Reading and Math**, with an **average expected grade-equivalent growth of 2 months**.
- Evidence of impact for Summer Learning in grades 9-12 (Credit Recovery) will be determined by the average of number of credits earned by each attending scholar, with an average expectation of 1 credit earned per attending scholar.
