COLLEGIATE STUDENTS FILL THEIR SUMMERS WITH ENRICHMENT PROGRAMS

This summer Collegiate scholars took advantage of enrichment programs, many with a focus on leadership.

Jada Reid (c/o 18) was selected to participate in Leadership Enterprise for a Diverse America (LEDA). During the 7-week summer program, scholars experience supervised college life at Princeton University, prepare for the SAT or ACT, study college-level writing, and explore selective colleges and universities. After the summer is over, LEDA continues to work with students as they apply for and are accepted into college.

Colin Williams (c/o 18) went to Missouri Boys State and Amaia Johnson (c/o 18) went to Missouri Girls State. Run by the American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary, respectively, these programs provide an "an eight-day hands-

on experience in the operation and fundamentals of government" and the opportunity to earn college credit at the University of Central Missouri. Amaia participated as a City Councilman and County Commissioner. Colin participated as a Police Officer.

Nya Fifer (c/o 19) and Naomi Steele (c/o 19) attended Missouri Scholars Academy at the University of Missouri, a program for gifted students entering their Junior year. MSA allows students to "enhance their academic skills; assimilate the accumulated knowledge of the culture; relate to contemporary issues; deepen understanding of themselves and their unique abilities; and engage others in critical-thinking and problem-solving activities."

JUNIORS BEGIN EARLY COLLEGE ACADEMY, ENROLL AT FPCC

Four Collegiate juniors have started this year as college students. Laura Marks, Susie Parker, Harper Brumbaugh, and Mateline Rogers met district qualifications, applied for, and were accepted to the Early College Academy (ECA). A partnership between St. Louis Public Schools and Forest Park Community College, ECA allows students to spend their junior and senior years of high school attending community college full-time. The program allows students to graduate with both their high school diploma and Associates Degree in general studies in the year they would normally earn their diploma; in this case, 2019. Qualified 10th graders will receive more information about Early College Academy applications later this year.
