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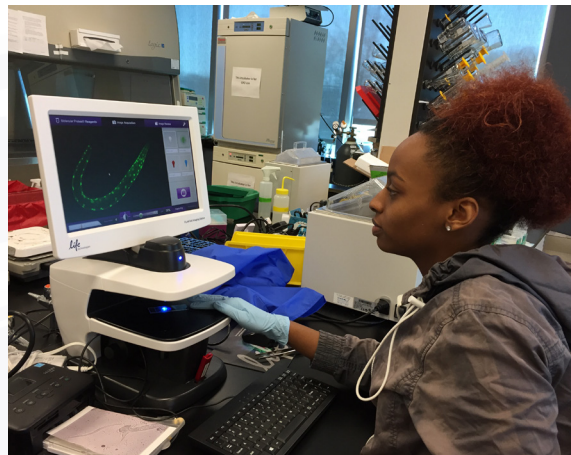
WHAT'S HAPPENING?

Perhaps the most unique thing about Collegiate is the opportunity our seniors have in their last semester to complete an internship or capstone at one of the many Collegiate partners—Universities such as Wash U and SLU Schools of Medicine, Logan U, BJC and Goldfarb School of Nursing, MOBOT, the Zoo, and Cortex—who are on the forefront

of scientific, medical, and technical research.

BETTER MAKE ROOM:

It has been an exciting year for college admissions at Collegiate. So far, 100% of our seniors have been accepted to at least one college or university. The majority of our seniors have finished all of their college applications, and are waiting until Spring (around April 1) to hear about acceptances to colleges. For schools that use "rolling admissions" rather than "regular decision" deadlines, the good news has been rolling in for our students.
